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Introduction & Welcome

Thank you for your interest in the Wapping Fair. Without your participation, we wouldn't be an agricultural fair. To make showing at Wapping a safer and more pleasurable experience, we would like to emphasize a few of the procedures in place at the fair.

First, please be sure to read the premium exhibitor guide carefully. Check your registration form before sending it in to make sure you have listed the correct classes, sections, and lot numbers. Also, please note the deadlines for submitting your exhibits. ENTRY FORMS FOR ANIMAL AND AGRICULTURE & ARTISTRY MAY BE FOUND AT THE END OF THIS GUIDE AND ON THE WWW.WAPPINGFAIR.ORG WEB SITE.

Second, please remember, non-animal entries, where possible, are preferred to be delivered before Saturday, but last-minute ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED ONLY UNTIL 8:45 AM ON SATURDAY. After that time, the exhibit tent will be closed so that judging may start promptly.

The animal tents will be open from 4 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. and after 7:30 p.m. on Friday to help facilitate the check-in process. Get here before the fair opens on Friday at 6:00 p.m. to avoid the traffic! The Agricultural & Arts area will be accepting non-perishable entries starting on Thursday morning and continuing through Friday evening (see schedule on next page). Both the animal and exhibit tents will be open starting at 7:30 AM SATURDAY MORNING for final drop-offs. No entries will be accepted after 8:45 am Sat. Agricultural and Arts Entries being submitted Saturday morning without prior registration (due August 31, 2024) will be limited to 3 per person.

For those showing livestock, please check in before removing your animals from the truck. Health papers must be checked and animals examined before the animals are unloaded.

When picking up exhibits on Sunday, please have your claim checks with you. No exhibit will be released without the stub. We don't want anyone walking off with your wonderful entries.

Please note that you will forfeit your premium money if you remove your exhibits prior to 5 p.m. on Sunday or if you do not pick up your exhibit at all. Remember part of being an exhibitor is letting others appreciate your talents and they cannot do that if the exhibits are not on the fairgrounds.

Finally, we ask that you submit your entry form by the August 31st deadline, so that on Saturday Sept. 7th you can pick up your pre-printed tags and display your wonderful exhibits. Without prior registration, you may be limited to the number of items you can enter and the process takes much longer to prepare the paperwork and exhibit tags.

RULES AND REGULATIONS - GENERAL

No Alcoholic Beverages will be allowed on the fairgrounds or any property being used by the fair.

No Pets will be allowed in parking lots or on the fairgrounds or any property being used by the fair.

The Wapping Fair is not responsible for fire, water damage or theft.

The Fair management shall have the right to refuse entry to any person or reject any entry which they believe not to be in the best interest of the Wapping Fair or if it deems advisable, for health standards.

Police and Fire protection will be provided. Wapping Fair will not be responsible for cars or personal property left with the cars.

The Wapping Fair and its officers will use all due precaution for the safety of goods on exhibition, but in no case will they be responsible for injury, loss or damage to any person, exhibit or personal property.

Anyone wishing to enter an exhibit should fill out an entry form and send it in by August 31. Please make all entries at one time. Pre-registration is recommended to avoid confusion. There is a limited amount of space. Space is reserved as applications are received. Class A-1 and Class A-2 are limited to 10 animals per exhibitor.

Agriculture and Arts exhibits are limited to 6 per person and entry forms must be received by August 31 to be considered appropriately registered for the 2024 Wapping Fair. Agricultural and Arts Entries being submitted Saturday morning without prior registration (due August 31, 2024) will be limited to 3 per person, and no individual may submit more than 6 total entries (regular registration or late entry registration combined.) Once tents have reached their maximum capacity the fair committee may cut off accepting entries.

All livestock must have been owned or managed by the exhibitor at least six months prior to the fair or, if less than six months of age, must be the offspring of livestock owned or managed by the exhibitor for six months prior to the fair. Current year 4-H projects are eligible and not restricted by the 6-month rule.

Be sure to read the exhibitor information carefully. Check your registration form before sending it in to make sure you have listed the correct classes, sections and lot numbers. Also, please note the deadlines for submitting your exhibits.

Agricultural exhibitors must give personal attention to delivery and removal of their exhibits: Exhibitors must arrange their own exhibits for judging when they drop off on Saturday morning. If an exhibitor has dropped off their exhibit to the Wapping Fair office earlier in the week, however, the committee will arrange the entries for them. The committee will not arrange unregistered materials for exhibit.

*Livestock exhibitors please check in before removing your animals from the truck. Plan timing so that check-in and delivery can be fully completed **before** 9 am Saturday. Per State regulations, health papers must be checked and animals examined before the animals are unloaded. Livestock exhibitors are responsible for understanding the 2024 Connecticut Fair Requirements. https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/doag/state-vet/2024/2024-updated-ct-fair-requirements.pdf

No person will be allowed to interfere with the judges when discharging their duties. Only judges and fair staff will be allowed into the Agricultural/Artistry tent during judging.

No person will be allowed to act as judge in any department in which they are a competitor.

All exhibits, including animals, will be shown on both Saturday and Sunday. Exhibits must be arranged by 9:00 am Saturday and must remain intact until 5:00 pm Sunday. Any exhibit removed before 5:00 pm or not picked up will forfeit premium money. Remember part of being an exhibitor is letting others appreciate your talents and they can't do that if the exhibits aren't on the fairgrounds.

All exhibits, including foods, vegetables and flowers, not removed by 6:00pm Sunday will be considered as donated to Wapping Fair and may be disposed of in any manner deemed fit by the fair committee.

- 1. Specimens competing for premiums must be the property of the exhibitor or leased as a project.
- 2. Poultry originating within the state must come from healthy flocks with no evidence of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases. All birds must be inspected, identified and be accompanied by written proof (Connecticut Flock Test card or Connecticut Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory Report) that verifies that the breeding flock or the individual birds listed on the report were blood-test negative for Salmonella pullorum with 365 days of the show date. Concurrent Avian Influenza testing of the flock and/or individual birds is strongly recommended. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates or vehicles used for housing or transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show, wheelbarrows/shovels recommended at end of fair. Doves, pigeons and water fowl are exempt from testing requirements except they must be identified with leg or wing tags.
- 3. Out of state Poultry may ONLY come from New England states and must comply with the Connecticut Department of Agriculture's 2024 Connecticut Fair and Show Requirements. Copies of the requirements are available from the Superintendent of Exhibits, any 4-H office in Connecticut or the Connecticut Department of Agriculture.
- 4. The superintendent has the right to accept or reject part or all of an entry. Any bird showing symptoms of sickness or disease will not be allowed to be exhibited.
- 5. Entries received after the deadline (August 31st) will be accepted at the discretion of the fair.





AGRICULTURE & ARTISTRY RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. All entries must have been made (e.g. artwork) or raised (e.g., vegetables) by the exhibitor within the past year.
- 2. Ribbons will be awarded for fourth and fifth prizes in this department.
- 3. Entries in the Junior Classes will be in three divisions:
- (a) 4, 5 and 6 years of age;
- (b) 7, 8 and 9 years of age;
- (c) 10 through 15 years of age.

All persons 16 years of age and older, must exhibit in the adult classes. Ages will be taken as of September 1st of the current year.

- 4. Junior Exhibitors are encouraged to enter items made in school.
- 5. Age of the exhibitor must be on all entry blanks. If there is more than one child in the family, each must submit a separate entry blank.
- 6. Where there is little or no competition in any class, the judges may, at their discretion, judge each entry on its own merit and not award first or second prize to exhibits of inferior quality. All decisions of the judges are final.
- 7. The Wapping Fair is not responsible for fire, water damage or theft.

- 5. JUDGING: Judging will be based on appearance, flavor and texture. The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges' score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Additions, deletions or substitutions in the recipe are not permitted and will result in disqualification. All decisions of the judges are final.
- 6. LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the local contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs and will then become eligible to submit their entry at the state contest. In the event that only one entry is received at the local contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, that entry must be awarded the first place ribbon.
- 8. STATE CONTEST: The state contest is held as part of the Fall Meeting and Convention of the Association of Connecticut Fairs. Entries for the state contest are accepted from 8:00 am to 10:00 a.m. on the day of the judging (contact your local fair or visit www.ctagfairs.org for the date and location). Contest winners are announced at the Fall Meeting. Each fair is responsible for contacting their contest winner and providing them with information. The Association of Connecticut Fairs does not contact individual fairs or contest winners in regards to contest and banquet reservations nor does the Association of Connecticut Fairs cover the costs of attending the awards banquet. NO BANQUET RESERVATIONS FOR CONTEST WINNERS WILL BE ACCEPTED AT THE DOOR.

Ingredients

Cake

- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 3/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 2 cups King Arthur Baking Unbleached All-Purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon table salt
- 3 tablespoons Dutch-process cocoa
- 3/4 teaspoon espresso powder

Cream Cheese Frosting

- 8 ounces cream cheese (brick-style), at room temperature
- 8 tablespoons unsalted butter (1 stick), at room temperature
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2 cups confectioner's sugar, sifted

Instructions

Cake

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly spray a 9" x 2" round baking pan with cooking spray. Line the bottom of the pan with a circle of parchment and spritz again. Set the pan aside.
- 2. In a bowl beat the sugar and eggs until lightened, about 2 minutes. On low speed, beat in the oil, milk, vanilla extract, and almond extract until smooth.
- 3. In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking powder and salt. Whisk to remove any lumps. Add the dry mixture to the wet ingredients. Combine on medium-speed 1-2 minutes or until the batter is smooth and lump free. Be sure to scrape down the bowl halfway through mixing.
- 4. Remove 2 cups of the vanilla batter and place it in a separate bowl. Sift the cocoa and espresso powder over the remaining batter in the bowl and stir well to combine. Be sure to use a sifter to avoid cocoa lumps in the batter.
- 5. Spoon 3 tablespoons of vanilla batter into the center of the cake pan. Next, spoon 3 tablespoons of the chocolate batter into the center of the vanilla batter. This causes the vanilla batter to spread out. Continue to alternate batters, in bulls-eye fashion until all batter is used. You will now have thin rings of each batter on the outer edges of the pan, thicker rings towards the center.
- 6. Bake the cake in the center of the preheated oven for 40 to 45 minutes, or until the cake is lightly browned and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Cool the cake in the pan for 10 minutes, and then, turn out onto a wire rack to finish cooling.

Cream Cheese Frosting

- 1. In a bowl, beat the cream cheese, butter, and vanilla on medium-high speed until very light, creamy, and smooth. On low speed, gradually add in the confectioner's sugar and beat until fluffy.
- 2. Frost top and side of cake.

Submit on foil-covered cardboard measured no more than one inch from side of cake.

- 2 Beat in the egg, again beating until smooth.

- 5 Drop the dough in 1 1/4" balls onto the prepared baking sheets; a tablespoon cookie scoop works well here. If you're measuring, this is about 2 level tablespoons (using a tablespoon measure, not a dinner spoon). For round, symmetrical cookies, be sure to leave 2" between them on all sides; otherwise, they'll spread into each other.
- 6 Bake the oatmeal cookies for 12 to 14 minutes, reversing the pans halfway through (top rack to bottom, bottom to top). For softer cookies, bake the lesser amount of time; for crunchier, the longer



amount. At 12 minutes, especially if you're baking on a dark pan without parchment, a few of the cookies on the edge should just barely have a bit of a pale brown around their edges. At 14 minutes, they should be starting to color all over.

- 7 Sprinkle a bit of salt atop the just-baked oatmeal cookies to bring their flavor over the top, if desired.
- 8 Remove the oatmeal cookies from the oven, and let them cool right on the pan.

- 7. Serve the cake warm or at room temperature. Wrap the completely cooled cake airtight, and store at room temperature for several days; freeze for longer storage.
